# REOPENING OF THE BLACK WATCH CASTLE AND MUSEUM

Following ten months of closure The Black Watch Castle and Museum reopened to the public on Tuesday 25th June 2013. A fine extension has been added, sympathetic to the existing building, providing not only much needed additional space but also, for the first time in the history of the Museum, a first class licensed Cafe, The Copper Beech. The Cafe serves quality snacks and meals, which are prepared and cooked on the premises with fresh locally sourced ingredients. A well-stocked Museum Shop offers attractive products that reflect not only the military character of the Museum but also quality items of interest to all. As a Friend you are eligible for not only free admission to the Museum but also 10% discount in the Copper Beech Cafe and Museum Shop.

The interior of the original Museum, housed in historic Balhousie Castle, has been redeveloped to realise the full potential of the building and exhibit the collections in their finest glory. The collections have been expertly and excitingly curated to bring to life the remarkable and inspiring story of The Black Watch, the Army's senior Highland Regiment. The gallery displays have been redesigned to tell the story of The Black Watch in a manner which brings the personal stories of the objects to life while engaging the visitor through state-of-the-art visual, interactive technology. The Museum team has ensured that while remodeling the galleries care has been taken to preserve the character of the building and the original Museum.

Lieutenant General Sir Alistair Irwin, Chairman of The Black Watch Museum Trust and President of the Friends said: "The project so dear to the hearts of so many in The Black Watch family and in the wider community began with the launch of a public appeal in 2008. We raised £3.5 million. This was thanks to a major grant from the Heritage Lottery Fund, as well as the Regimental family and to the very great generosity of many Charitable Trusts and individuals. This has enabled

us to realise a long-standing dream to expand the premises, to provide new facilities for members of the Regiment and for visitors and to provide a permanent home to the Museum and archive collections."

A pre-opening event was held for those involved in taking the project to fruition. This was combined with the raising of the Armed Forces Day flag, a ceremony attended by Liz Grant, Provost of Perth and Kinross and Honorary Friend. This was followed by the opening of the Museum by Brigadier (Retd) Jameson, Lord Lieutenant of Perth and Kinross, who is also a Honorary Friend. The world renowned Pipes and Drums of The Black Watch, 3rd Battalion, The Royal Regiment of Scotland, wowed the audience with a spectacular and rousing display of traditional regimental music and dance.

To thank the Friends for their support, the Museum hosted an exclusive after hours event. Friends were able to review the changes and appraise the redeveloped galleries at their leisure.

# MUSEUM REDEVELOPMENT A UNIQUE INSIGHT

James Watt, Museum Trustee and Friends Treasurer reflects on his involvement with the Castle and Museum redevelopment.....

It was a great moment for me when we opened the new Museum to the Friends for the first time at the Cocktail Party on 20 June 2013. I have been part of the Museum Working Party over the last three years and have learned a lot about museums and about The Black Watch in that time.

I have also really enjoyed the experience. It has been a real privilege to work closely with Emma Halford-Forbes and her team. It has been good to get to know Allan Carswell, our external project curator who has guided us throughout, and Studio MB, our exhibition designers, who have been excellent since their appointment two years ago. We have spent many long days together in a creative and constructive way. I think we have had an outstanding Museum redevelopment team.

### **OUR AIMS**

I hope you have had an opportunity to enjoy the new Museum already and that you enjoyed the experience. If not do come as soon as you can! I believe you will agree that we have retained the Museum's much loved traditional style while embracing a modern and fresh quality. We have been greatly helped by what I am sure you will agree are very sympathetic alterations to the Castle. We are confident that the Museum will be a major attraction to new visitors and the vibrant heart of the broader visitor experience that is the new Balhousie.

# WHAT STAYS THE SAME AND WHAT CHANGES?

The collection and the history of The Black Watch remain at the heart of the Museum so there is a lot of natural continuity. But there are important changes which will make our collection and story more accessible to a wider audience. We use a wide range of display and design techniques to bring the artefacts to life. We will also have much better facilities in the galleries and behind the scenes for conservation and security of the collection and archived collection (see image on the right). Further work has been done on cataloguing and researching the collection. Some important items will be on display for the first time, including VCs won by members of the Regiment in the Indian Mutiny, Egypt and the First World War. The descriptions of galleries, cases and artefacts have been completely reworked to make them much more coherent and accessible. Displays, graphics and lighting have all been created to enable the visitor to connect with the events and the individuals associated with the items on display. We have also used material from the archived collections to develop these individual stories.

# SOME PERSONAL HIGHLIGHTS

Here are some of my personal highlights from the new Museum. The introduction gallery (see image on the right) immediately immerses the visitor in the elements that make up the unique identity of The Black Watch through our principal emblems and icons: The Black Watch name, the Red Hackle, the Tartan and the Badge.

In the gallery devoted to the French Wars there is an animation of the Glasgow Green painting. This illustrates the various roles in the companies of The Black Watch which are shown being inspected before departing for America in 1756, shortly before the Battle of Ticonderoga.

I think all the galleries have their own atmosphere. But if I have to single one gallery out then it has to be the one devoted to the First World War (see image on p5). 50,000 men passed through the ranks of The Black Watch from 1914 to 1918. Of these over 8,000 were killed and over 20,000 were wounded. This is clearly the period when the strong bonds that link The Black Watch to the regimental area of Angus, Dundee, Fife and Perthshire were forged. If there is a single reason why the Museum must be here in Perth and for the long term this is probably it.

I find real inspiration in the way The Black Watch met the immense challenge of the First World War. We tell this story by considering the various ways men joined The Black Watch and the different types of Battalion they served in – The Regulars, Territorials, New Army and Canadian Black Watch. We tell the overall story by looking at some of the 50,000 stories of individuals.

Then in the later galleries we leave the chronological sequence behind to look at other aspects of regimental life. We have a gallery devoted to a "Day in the Life" of the Regiment (see image on the right). This illustrates the routines that dominate a soldier's life, especially in peacetime, and includes the pipe and bugle calls that marked the passing hours.

It is worth taking the time to linger in any of the galleries.

There is a lot to take in at any one time. I hope you will be able to make a number of visits and over time have the opportunity to linger in each of the galleries in turn.

# **FRIENDS SUPPORTING THE MUSEUM**

# SPONSORING A DISPLAY CASE

The principal purpose of the Friends is to support the on-going work of the Castle and Museum. Money is raised through Membership Subscriptions, events and donations. At the end of the Friends first full financial year 2011-2012 there was a small surplus. This was spent on sponsoring a large display case within the Museum in support of The Black Watch Heritage Appeal. This is a three dimensional case which is located centre stage in the French Wars Gallery (1745-1815), see images below. It contains an array of fascinating artefacts and interpretation including prints of the Battle of Quatre Bras 1815, artefacts belonging to Major Robert Dick of Tulliment, but most significantly the remains of the King's Colour and Regimental Colour carried by the 1st Battalion, The Black Watch during the Peninsular War and Waterloo Campaign. It is thought that these Colours were presented in 1802 while the Regiment was in Edinburgh. Both incorporate the post 1801 version of the Union Flag, which includes the Cross of St Patrick and the Sphinx Badge awarded to the Regiment for its service in 1801. The Colours were replaced by a new set on March 7, 1839

### FRIENDS APPLYING FOR GRANTS

There is large number of exciting Museum and education projects that the Museum team have on their wish list; such as a touring play to mark the centenary of the outbreak of the First World War. This is a brand new production commissioned by Theatre Centre and written by Jesse Briton. It is geared towards an audience of 13-18yrs and includes a question and answer session with the actors afterwards, as well as a copy of the script. This play would encourage an audience that can be difficult to attract into the Museum.

With such exciting prospective projects, the Friends have been looking at additional methods of generating income to support the Museum in bringing projects, such as the one detailed, to fruition. As the Friends are a separate charity from the Museum we can apply for grants in our own right. We are setting up a sub-team of Friends who are interested and committed to researching the various grants that are available, working with the Museum team to identify projects that fit with the Friends aim and applying for the grants. # GIFT AID ON MEMBERSHIP SUBSCRIPTIONS

The Friends had hoped to be able to claim Gift Aid on Membership Subscriptions. However, after careful consideration the Management Committee has decided that we will not claim Gift Aid on Membership Subscriptions. We will however claim Gift Aid on donations which are not Membership Subscriptions. The background to this decision is that in order to claim Gift Aid on Membership Subscriptions we would be required to demonstrate that the benefits Members derive from their membership do not exceed 25% of the relevant Membership Subscription amount. Some benefits, including free entry to the Museum, are not treated as a benefit. But Shop and Cafe

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discounts provided by The Black Watch Castle and Museum do count as benefits as do Friend's discounts to events and the cost of any events put on especially for Friends. The good news is that Friends do increasingly take advantage of these benefits; the bad news is that it then becomes increasingly difficult to claim Gift Aid on Membership Subscriptions. An added factor in our decision is the complexity of the information we would have to gather and keep to justify any claim that we might still be able to make. This decision will apply retrospectively to all periods since the formation of the Friends. Should the pattern of our activity change at some point in the future we may reconsider this decision. But until further notice we will only claim for Gift Aid relief on donations and not on Membership Subscriptions.

# WINTER LECTURES

The Winter Lecture Series will continue this year in a very similar format as previously. The lectures will still be on the second Tuesday of every month, with half at lunch time and half in the evening in order to try and accommodate different schedules.

There are a number of new speakers who have kindly agreed to speak this year and whom we are very excited to welcome to our Museum. In October Dr Andrew MacKillop, Senior Lecturer at the University of Aberdeen, will be talking to us on 'Motive and Identity in Highland Soldiering in the Late 18th Century'.

On 21st October Brigadier (Retd) Jameson comes to the Castle to lecture on his colourful career organising Military Tattoos. As producer and Chief Executive of the Edinburgh Military Tattoo for 12 years, he has travelled extensively in order to book the international participants – an arduous and highly responsible task which he nevertheless undertook willingly! Colonel (Retd ) John Blair, author of In Arduis Fidelis: Centenary History of the Royal Army Medical Corps, 1898-1998, will join us in November for an interesting lecture on the history of 'Battlefield medicine'.

Lt Col (Retd) Willie Coupar will bring us up to Christmas with his December lecture entitled 'A Morecamb and Wise Act in the South Atlantic' which will provide an insight into a side of service life not so widely known about.

### **ADULT EVENTS**

The Adult Events Programme for Autumn/Winter 2013 also includes a kilt-making course, run by Friend and Volunteer Ruari Halford-MacLeod. Over the course of four two-hour sessions, Ruari will introduce attendees to the box-pleated kilt and take them through the process of hand-making this style of kilt. This promises to be a fun, practical and interesting course.

#### FAMILY PROGRAMME

The Family Programme includes regular dropin craft sessions and bookable workshops as well as seasonal events. Every second Saturday





afternoon the Education Room at the Castle is open for our young visitors and their families to drop in and try their hand at different crafts such as designing and making their own medals or using various materials to create a Black Watch soldier and occasionally even making origami tanks! During school holidays there are additional craft afternoons as well as bookable workshops on a range of subjects linked to the Museum collection.

# **ABF - THE SOLDIERS' CHARITY**

Some of our Friends are involved with supporting ex-service personal one of these charities is the ABF - Army Benevolent Fund. The Soldiers' Charity was founded in 1944 to provide lifetime support for serving soldiers, former soldiers and their families in times of need. The aim is to make grant payments within 48 hours of receiving an application, often making a significant difference at a critical point in people's lives. Grants help provide practical assistance including home adaptations, mobility assistance, education and training, respite care, furnishings and equipment. In Scotland in the last financial year the Soldiers' Charity assisted with 972 grants to individuals with another 3,500 beneficiaries being helped by charities providing bespoke help, e.g. residential care. Through the London office additional funding is given to other UK wide services charities with outlets in Scotland, such as SSAFA, Poppy Scotland and Combat Stress. Overall, approximately £1 million was spent in Scotland in FY 12/13 based on the sound principle that every penny raised in Scotland is spent in Scotland.

# **MUSEUM OF THE ROYAL HIGHLAND FUSILIERS**

In June 2013, a group of Friends visited the Museum of The Royal Highland Fusiliers in Sauchiehall Street, Glasgow. Housed in a fine Victorian property, this museum is filled with an amazing range of artefacts and memorabilia reflecting the world-wide service of The Royal Scots Fusiliers and The Highland Light Infantry over the past 300 years.

After being welcomed by the Regimental Secretary, Colonel Bobby Steele DL, and fortified by coffee and biscuits, the Friends were given free range to explore the exhibits at their own pace. In the course of this they learned of the exploits of the RSF under Marlborough and during the American War of Independence, and of the HLI at Assaye and in the Peninsula. All were impressed by the huge involvement of both regiments in the two World Wars. Overall it was a real learning experience which even included the similarities in uniform between The Black Watch and The Glasgow Highlanders (9th Bn HLI). It was a most interesting visit and all felt they would like to return to see more.

To inspire your interest to visit these fabulous Museums here is a taste of their illustrious history....

The Royal Scots Dragoon Guards (RSDG) was formed in 1971 from The Royal Scots Greys (2nd Dragoons) and the 3rd Carabiniers

(Prince of Wales's Dragoon Guards). The regiment is still affectionately known in Scotland as "The Greys" from the grey horses of The Royal Scots Greys. The badge of the RSDG is a silver eagle upon a plaque, Waterloo, surmounting crossed carbines in gilt with the scroll "Royal Scots Dragoon Guards". The Eagle and Waterloo, reflect the capture of a French Imperial Eagle by Sergeant Ewart of the Greys at Waterloo whilst the crossed carbines and the title "The King's Carabiniers" were awarded to the 9th Horse, one of the antecedent regiments of the 3rd Carabiniers, for distinguished service at the Battle of the Boyne in 1690.

The history of the RSDG and its antecedent regiments is a long and proud one ranging from the Battle of Bothwell Brig against the Covenanters in 1679, to the capture of Basra in the recent Iraq War covering pretty well every major conflict involving the British Army, including Marlborough's campaigns, the Penisular War,

the Crimea and the battles of El Alamein and Imphal in the Second World War.

The Royal Scots, The Royal Regiment, the 1st Regiment of Foot (RS) was the senior infantry regiment of the British Army, until it was amalgamated with The King's Own Scottish Borderers in 2006 to become 1 SCOTS or Royal Scots Borderers. It was formed in 1633 by John Hepburn to serve in France under Louis XIII. Having returned home in 1678, it served with distinction under the Earl of Dumbarton in the defence of Tangier from 1680 - 84, and was on the right of the line at Sedgemoor which ended the Monmouth Rebellion in 1685.

As with the RSDG the RS took part in most engagements thereafter, seeing action under Marlborough from 1704 - 1708, at Fontenoy in 1745, in the Peninsula, at Waterloo, the Crimea and the capture of the Taku Forts, to name but a few. The regiment fought with great distinction in World War I on the Western Front, Gallipoli, and Palestine. The gallant story continued into World War II in the retreat to Dunkirk, NW Europe, the fall of Hong Kong and the advance into Burma. In 1991 the RS took part in the first Gulf War on the advance to Kuwait City.

These are just some of the exploits in which these two famous Scottish regiments have distinguished themselves. Do join the Friends party on 19th November to see and learn a great deal more!

# **BALHOUSIE CASTLE** UNDERSTANDING ITS HERITAGE

Following the redevelopment project, in June the new Balhousie Castle was presented to the public; now seems a fitting time to reflect on the life and times of the historic Perthshire Castle...

The origins of Balhousie Castle are said to date back to the 14<sup>th</sup> century. An earlier, unidentified building, of which nothing now remains, was replaced in 1631 by a traditional L-Shaped tower house. This fell into semi-ruin in the early 19<sup>th</sup> century and was rebuilt in its present form in the 1860s.

Documentary evidence for the existence of the Castle begins in the 15<sup>th</sup> century. It was well documented as the Castle was closely involved with the Perthshire aristocracy, in particular the Eviot and Hay families. In 1422, Murdoch Stewart, Duke of Albany, granted the Barony of Balhousie to John Eviot. Until 1609 the property remained with the Eviot family, except for a brief interlude when the Mercers (a well-known family in the Burgh of Perth) had possession of it. At this time the lands were sold by Colin Eviot to John Mathew, son of Robert Mathew, merchant of Perth.

On 27 September 1625, King Charles I granted the lands and barony of Balhousie to Master Francis Hay, the son of Peter Hay of Rattray. He acquired several properties in Perthshire and Wigtownshire, and was awarded the barony of Dupplin in 1642. He was succeeded by his son George (died 1672), who in turn was succeeded by his son Thomas. The Hay family was responsible for the building of the tower house in 1631.

Thomas Hay of Balhousie was the Member of Parliament for Perthshire in the 1690s. He was made Viscount Dupplin on 31 December 1697. William, sixth Earl of Kinnoull, died unmarried in London on 10 May 1709 and Thomas succeeded to the title as seventh Earl. He was suspected of favouring the Jacobites and was imprisoned in Edinburgh Castle, dying four years later. The succession of Earls continued, George Henry, eighth Earl, Member of Parliament for Fowey, Cornwall; Thomas, ninth Earl, Member of Parliament for Cambridge; Robert Auriol Hay Drummond, who succeeded his uncle as tenth Earl and was appointed Lord Lyon King of Arms. His son, Thomas Robert, eleventh Earl, was Colonel of the Royal Perthshire Militia from 1809 until 1855. Appointed Lord Lieutenant of the County he succeeded his father as Lord Lyon, King of Arms. It was he who extended the Castle.

The Hay's remained at their main residence at Dupplin until the early  $20^{th}$  century. Whether the Castle was regularly inhabited during this period is unclear, but we do know that by the 1860s it was in a dilapidated state (see top left image).

Thomas Robert Hay, 11<sup>th</sup> Earl, decided to restore Balhousie and added two wings to the original L-shaped tower house. He employed the local architect David Smart who was involved in many public and private building projects in the Perth area from the late 1850s onwards, including designing Kilgraston House in Bridge of Earn.

The Castle was then rented out to private tenants. The Hay family returned to live at the Castle around 1912 and remained until 1926. The images above of Balhousie Castle sitting room in the late 19<sup>th</sup> century are what is now the Museum's Empire Gallery (see page 3).

The Castle then became a convent. The nuns were from the Society of St Peter and were associated with St Ninian's Episcopal Cathedral in Atholl Street, Perth. They appear to have resided in the Castle until around 1940, when the building was requisitioned by the Army and used during the Second World War by the Auxiliary Training Service as Officers Quarters. After the War, it housed a detachment of the Royal Army Service Corps as well as the Headquarters, Highland District, Corps of Royal Engineers.

In the early 1960s there was a major Army re-organisation. The Black Watch Depot at the Queen's Barracks was closed and the Regimental Headquarters and the Museum came to the Castle. Following the subsequent amalgamation of the Scottish Regiments in 2006, The Black Watch Regiment became The Black Watch, 3<sup>rd</sup> Battalion The Royal Regiment of Scotland (3 SCOTS) and the

Regimental Headquarters ceased to exist. Balhousie Castle was purchased by the Museum Trustees from the Ministry of Defence in 2009. The long association with the Regiment continues with The Black Watch Museum and The Black Watch Association still housed at the Castle. This has been strengthened through the redevelopment of the Castle and the building of the new extension.

The new extension was designed to be sympathetic to the existing Castle of Balhousie whilst ensuring it can fulfil the function of a visitor attraction. For example, a new courtyard space was created on arrival at the building, which draws on the tradition of  $16^{th}$  and  $17^{th}$  century castles with courtyards built to form external spaces.

The redeveloped Balhousie Castle now houses The Black Watch Museum, Shop and the Copper Beech Cafe. It provides improved storage for the artefacts and archived collections, improved visitor facilities, lift access and a learning space. The Castle is a fitting place to preserve and display the legacy of The Black Watch for this and future generations.

# **VOLUNTEERS AT BALHOUSIE**

Major (Retd) Derek Mowatt, Friends Events Committee Member, has a connection with Balhousie Castle that spans his lifetime. Here Derek shares with us his memories, experiences and view on Balhousie Castle today.....

My first contact with Balhousie Castle was in 1941 when the War Office requisitioned spare accommodation within my family home for the placement of three A.T.S women. This Auxiliary

Territorial Service was a uniformed corps for females only who were employed as cooks, typists, clerkesses and drivers.... Some 65,000 served during the war.

Perth was a central transport hub for troop movements to the northernmost areas of the country at war, and

Balhousie Castle was an important administrative centre for the transit of thousands of servicemen. Inevitably I would be taken to their place of work in the Castle. The excitement for a four year old boy was boundless when faced by scores of uniformed personnel, lorries, the clatter of typewriters, spiral staircases, huge rooms, tiny round rooms, attic rooms, turrets and kitchens with jam sandwiches!

Twenty years later, after six years of study and service with St Andrews University O.T.C, I was commissioned into The Black Watch as a Territorial Officer based in Perth. Commensurately the Regimental Headquarters moved from the depot in Barrack Street to Balhousie Castle taking its Museum collection for display in these much more spacious circumstances. As a student I had specialised in the practice and study of fine arts and I soon realised that there was a remarkable collection of photographs, prints, watercolours and oil paintings dating from the earliest days of the Regiment's existence.

In the late 1990's a group of Volunteers including a team from NADFAS was put in place to enhance the many aspects of the collection and under the guidance of the regular staff, the

upgrading and improvements to hundreds of artefacts continued apace. Two events with far reaching consequences brought this phase of work to a finish. The change in status of the Regiment and the decision of the Trustees to purchase Balhousie Castle and to extend the space. Part-time Volunteers were then replaced by Museum professionals, architects, exhibition design specialists and many more to create the team needed to take forward Project Balhousie. This outcome, open to the public, is simply magnificent and has been lauded by all who have visited the redeveloped Castle and Museum. But, without the work of those earlier Volunteers, the transfer of uniforms, medals, silverware, rare artefacts and photographs and oil paintings to their new home would have been less seamless than it was. Volunteers continue to play a vital role in the redeveloped Castle and Museum, all of whom continue to give their time, commitment, skills and knowledge to ensure that all who visit The Black Watch Castle and Museum have a memorable experience.

# HOW THE VOLUNTEER ROLE CONTINUES....

In August, The Black Watch Castle and Museum announced its first Volunteer **Photographer in Residence**. This unique Volunteer opportunity is taken by former Perthshire Advertiser Photographer Graeme Lafferty. Graeme will give his time, skill, and extensive knowledge in his field to support the Museum in documenting and promoting the Museum and archived collection, the redeveloped site, events and much more through the medium of photography.

After leaving school at 15, Graeme studied photography at Napier College, Edinburgh. His first job in photography was with well-known Edinburgh photographer Murray Donald, where he spent one year before joining the Scottish Tourist board for the next 18 months. Graeme joined the Perthshire Advertiser in January 1974 starting out as junior photographer and rising through the ranks to chief photographer; he now works freelance. We thank Graeme for his time and skill. The newsletter front cover image was taken by Graeme as well as many of the gallery images throughout these pages.

Graeme explains, "The 38 years I spent at the PA was very enjoyable, but I took up the opportunity to go freelance last year which so far I am enjoying very much. I am now looking forward to a new challenge and being part of the Volunteer team at The Black Watch Museum."

# **MUSEUM EXHIBITIONS**

# THE SWORD AND THE PENCIL JUNE TO OCTOBER 2013

The Sword and the Pencil is the Museum's first exhibition which features a small but very special selection of photographs, watercolours and sketchbooks. All of these artworks belonging to the collection of The Black Watch are now on display for the first time.

The Black Watch owns a large collection of works of art of arguably national significance. It is due to limitations of space that a number of them have never been exhibited before. This exhibition aims to cast a glance over some of these unknown and hidden treasures, full of meaning and artistic value.

All of them illustrate different chapters of the history of The Black Watch, from the Crimean War to the patronage of the Royal Family. The variety of unique objects preserved by this Museum covers nearly three centuries of art patronage and collecting, and reflects the presence of Scottish soldiers all over the world. All the objects in this exhibition have in common their documentary and historic character, but also their significance as genuine works of art, regardless of their frequently overwhelming military past.

# MUSKETS, KHURIS AND BROADSWORDS OCTOBER TO APRIL 2013

Muskets, Khukris and Broadswords exhibition is due to open in October. It will be showcasing some of the most interesting examples of firearms and bladed weapons in the Museum collection that have been used by The Black Watch and the armies they fought against throughout the regiment's history.

The exhibition will draw upon a specific selection of weapons that illustrate the developments in technology and fighting style during different periods of history, and will look at how these weapons compare in their use and why certain changes were made to improve their efficiency.

The aim of the exhibition is to tell the story of the evolution of some of the best known weapons used by The Black Watch, including the Brown Bess musket and Highland broadsword, while introducing more unusual weapons that were temporarily adopted by the regiment, such as khukris, pangas, and tomahawks. Weapons such as these, as well as others that were brought back from campaigns as souvenirs, will offer the visitor a different way of looking at the history of The Black Watch and how they fought different armies across the globe.

# **MUSEUM ARTWORK FOCUS**

The Castle and Museum holds an impressive collection of both official and personal materials that reflect the life and activities of Scotland's most Senior Highland Regiment. The Museum has a particularly fine collection of paintings, including items deemed of national significance. Using research conducted by Helen Smailes, Senior Curator of British Art at the National Galleries of Scotland and Alan Carswell, redevelopment external project curator, we highlight three of our artwork pieces that you can see when you visit the Museum.

#### THE BLACK WATCH AT BAY by William Barnes Wollen

The Black Watch at Bay has pride of place in the Copper Beech Cafe where it is hung above the grand stone fireplace. This is one of the most magnificent paintings in the collection and has become an icon of the Museum, due in no small part to its topic and its size, an impressive 156 by 215cm. The painting was brought to the Museum in 1950 with the assistance of an endowment from the late Major-General A H Marindin. The Black Watch at Bay was painted in 1894 by the artist William Barnes Wollen (b.1857-d.1936). He was a leading practitioner in historicising battle painting in the 19<sup>th</sup> century. He was later engaged by The Sphere newspaper as its official war artist covering the Boer War, but is highly regarded for his battle paintings of the Napoleonic era. Wollen's work is included in the collections of the National Army Museum, the National War Museum of Scotland and several English regimental museums.

The painting captures the moment when the 42nd were ordered to hold the crossroads at Quatre Bras on 16th June 1815, which was a critical point in the Regiment's history. Advancing through head-height rye, they were caught out of square by French cavalry. Lieutenant Colonel Macara is pictured (near the Colours at the top left), shouting orders to his troops. During the battle, Macara was killed and Robert Dick took command. Despite losing its Colonel and other senior officers, the 42<sup>nd</sup> managed to form a square, forcing the French to retire. They held the crossroads and this allowed Wellington to pass onto Waterloo and his great victory two days later, in which both the 42<sup>nd</sup> and the 73<sup>rd</sup> Regiments took part. In the upper left hand corner of the painting, in the background, two flags are depicted – these are the Regimental Colours. The Regimental Colours carried at Quatre Bras and Waterloo have recently been restored and are displayed in the French Wars Gallery in the case sponsored by the Friends.

### MARRIAGE PORTRAIT OF LIEUTENANT COLONEL JAMES STEWART TO WILLIAMINA KERR

A favourite painting of the Museum staff is the Marriage Portrait of Lieutenant Colonel James Stewart to Williamina Kerr 1803 by James Giles (b.1801-d.1870), as it is one of the few paintings in the collection which portrays a female. This is an oil painting on canvas, 102 x 75cm. This painting can be viewed by visiting the ground floor of the Museum in the hallway leading to the temporary exhibition space. Born in Aberdeen, Giles was the son of a designer at the local calico printing factory, an artist of some repute. His father's early death threw Giles upon his own resources at an early age. Giles was a versatile artist; he specialised in portraiture and landscape painting, but in addition was a successful landscape architect. Giles became an academician of the Royal Scottish Academy, and contributed numerous works to its exhibitions from that time until near the close of his career. He also exhibited frequently at the British Institution in London, and occasionally at the Royal Academy and the Society of British Artists.

Lieutenant Colonel James Stewart joined The Black Watch as a Lieutenant in 1777. He retired as a Lieutenant Colonel in 1804 and died in 1819. He married Williamina Kerr in 1803; however, this painting is dated 1846-1849 so is likely to be a retrospective or copy of an earlier portrait. The pensive expression on Williamina's face is one which is much talked about amongst the female staff: what was she thinking?

# COMRADES

by Robert Gibb

An ionic image of the military art genre is Comrades by Robert Gibb (b.1845-d.1932), which was first exhibited at the Royal Scottish Academy in 1887. The location of this original painting is now unknown (see image on the right).

Whilst studying the life of Napoleon, Gibb had made a sketch of the retreat from Moscow. The dominant group of three figures in the foreground was then isolated and adapted to form an independent composition depicting a young soldier whispering a dying message to a comrade who seeks to comfort him amidst the snowy wastes of the Crimean winter. It was during the winter of 1854-5 that The Black Watch suffered particularly heavy losses from the severe weather and disease.

The original Comrades picture was purchased by Archibald Ramsden, a major patron of Gibb, and it was recorded to be in his possession in 1897. The Museum holds a fine autograph replica by Gibb in oils, signed and dated 1894. This replica painting of Comrades is located in the Empire gallery on the first floor of the Museum. This work is of national significance given the disappearance from public records of the 1878 original. Additionally the Museum has a spectacular piece of Scottish stained glass with a design deriving from Comrades and portraying a Seaforth Highlander standing guard over two Black Watch soldiers (see image below). Its original provenance is unknown. This can be seen when visiting the Remembrance gallery on the ground floor of the Museum.

# **A MOMENT FOR REFLECTION**

Major General Mike Riddell-Webster CBE DSO, Friend of the Castle and Museum reflects on Project Balhousie from its origin to the operational stage of the redeveloped Museum....

Project Balhousie has been sometime in the making and having completed the building and redevelopment phase, we are now only just at the beginning of the long-term operational stage of the project. It is therefore worth reflecting on why we set about the project and just how far we have come.

The idea of redeveloping Balhousie had its origin in the changing shape of the British Army. Well before it actually happened, Lieutenant General Sir Alistair Irwin saw the likely formation of The Royal Regiment of Scotland and the effect that that was bound to have on our Regimental Headquarters. In order to ensure the long-term future of Balhousie, something had to change and "going private" was an obvious approach, but for the inability of the old Balhousie to house a Shop and Cafe and so provide the necessary income. Project Balhousie was born. Originally the project aimed to just build an extension to the original Balhousie, but it became clear that not to take the opportunity to overhaul the Museum and so be able to display our fabulous collection to its best advantage would be a huge mistake.

The enormously successful fund raising appeal was run brilliantly and tirelessly by Appeal Director and Friend, David Noble. The substantial grant from the Heritage Lottery Fund and other generous Trusts and Charities enabled us the reach the £3.5 million target and start work on the building project; the glorious end result is now open to all. The Museum now houses a fantastic, modern, friendly and accessible collection, as well as the opportunity for souvenir shopping and a bite to eat in the Copper Beech Cafe. The main build having been achieved, the team at Balhousie are now settling into the routine of making the business work and so safeguarding the future of The Black Watch name, history and fame.

Getting to where we are has involved the most tremendous amount of hard work from a hugely dedicated team – too many to mention all by name – but spearheaded by Jamie Montgomery, James Watt and Alfie Iannetta and I cannot praise them all enough for delivering the original vision in such splendid style.

As we move into our improved Black Watch home, we now need to do all we can to ensure its continuing success, financially as well as becoming part of the fabric of the City of Perth.

The Friends organisation will be an integral part in merging the Museum with, not only the local community, but also regional and national supporters, who by joining the Friends, are helping to secure the future of The Black Watch legacy.
